Doing the Right Thing for the Right Reasons

You don't need to know everything about municipal government before you run for council. Your success in local government will depend a lot on your intentions going into it and your willingness to learn. When the intentions of elected officials don't align with what a municipality is and does, big problems can occur!

Not So Good Reasons to Serve on Council

To make decisions that advance your personal agenda

To have control over what happens in your municipality

To finally address that one thing that concerns you

To force your neighbors to do things you want them to do

Because you are mad at the current council

Good Reasons to Serve on Council

To make decisions that benefit the community as a whole

To share your unique knowledge and experience to contribute to council discussions and decisions

To help ensure the long-term success of your community

To help your municipality set fair bylaws and policies that apply to everyone equally

To work with others to accomplish common goals

The Learning Curve

Serving in public office is a job unlike any other. This makes it quite exciting, but it also requires the elected to gain a new perspective and follow regulations (e.g., legislation, bylaws, and policies, etc.) that are unique to local governments. You'll have to shift your thinking to work with the framework of a municipality, rather than a business or a household.

The Saskatchewan Government Ministry of Government Relations has provided some excellent resources to help potential candidates understand what will be expected of them.

If SARM could draw your attention to just one critical piece of information, it would be the “Public Disclosure Statement” requirement. This must be completed at various times throughout your term. The rules around transparency and “conflict of interest” often catch newly elected councillors off guard! (PS., some municipalities require that you get a criminal record check, so check with your local administrator to see if that applies to you, too.)
